The King's Coronation was a moment in time never to be forgotten. Harwich's tribute to the celebration in the sea of flags displaying red white and blue gave the town centre and Harwich Quay the most patriotic feel of celebration. Both funded by Harwich Town Council, the Electric Palace offered free seats to anyone wishing to view the new Monarch's Coronation as they laid on a free screening, complete with aptly fitting union hand held flags and Dovercourt Town Centre threw the 'Big Coronation Party' with members of the community joining together in the High



Street in celebration.



The 80th anniversary of the Battle of the Atlantic was commemorated in Harwich at the poignant location of the Merchant Navy Memorial. This battle is known to be one of the longest, largest, and most complex battles of all time and one which changed communities and lives forever. Over 70,000 allied naval and merchant seafarers lost their lives in this battle. Harwich Town Council was honoured to commemorate this anniversary on Sunday 28th May 2023, coming together in recognition of those so brave

and courageous in this monumental victorious fight for their country. A tremendous turn out and tribute was warmly comforting from local organisations, Standards and wreath laying. One personal wreath was laid by a local member of the community, whose father played an active role within this battle. Huge thanks are extended to all that attended the service, to Ellie Bould of Tendring Brass who played The Last Post and Reveille, and to Bob Bliss who commanded the Standards in a way so professional and respectfully placed.

#### Take a walk into History

The home of Harwich Town Council is Harwich's historic Guildhall in Church Street. The Guildhall is the only secular Grade I listed building in the Tendring district and is a fascinating place to visit.

The Guildhall is also the repository for Harwich Town Council's archives which contain documents dating from the 16<sup>th</sup> century including the original 1604 royal charter granted by King James I. The archives are overseen by the council's honorary archivists, Ray Plummer and Anne Kemp-Luck who also conduct guided tours of the building. In recent years, Cllrs. Garry Calver and Pam Morrison have assisted in the role of guides and the Guildhall is attracting interest from a wide variety of visitors. This year alone there have seen visitors of Mayflower descendants from America, a group from Clacton Royal British Legion and the Holland on Sea U3A History group as well as a number of individual tours.

Harwich Town Council believes that the history within this wonderful building is another hook to encourage people to visit Harwich which can only assist with the town's tourist economy.
